

I hope you all had a wonderful spring break! It was great to see all the Seedlings again after the break, they all looked so much bigger! A big part of our week was getting back into the routine of the classroom.

Day 1 with the new carpeting! Set A freshly watered plant in black dirt bit the dust. No worries, it cleaned up nicely. Tofte

stain is persistent, the carpet was installed in squares, so the area can be replaced. Extra carpet has been stored. Splendid. This week's theme was "In the Garden". We read the book How Does Your Garden Grow? by Pat Patterson. It tells the story of a young girl and boy growing a garden from the perspective of an earthworm, ant, and caterpillar. We used caterpillar, butterfly, and ladybug hand puppets to spark imagination and creativity.



We worked our sense of smell by trying to smell artificial flowers that had been scented with lavender. We also painted with our taste safe paint again this week for our sensory activity.

Saplings were welcomed back from spring break with a celebration of National Crayon Day. They engaged in a color analysis of every crayon in the 24-crayon box and drew the letter 'C' using their most preferred color. Following a reading of the classic Harold and the Purple Crayon by Crockett Johnson, each Sapling drew their own world of adventure with a purple crayon. This was succeeded by a nature walk, where the Saplings took note of diverse objects and used their power of imagination to make their own world of play. In the writing center, a variety of Harold and the Purple Crayon-themed prewriting skill sheets were available, featuring

line tracing, shape tracing, mazes, and picture tracing.

Ahhh, April Fools! Saplings were fooled with some brown-Es for a snack, followed by real brownies. Many made their own brown-Es to fool their family. But we were all fooled by the weather!

The week's theme revolved around Branches, Buds and Blossoms, where we discussed the life cycle of trees. Identifying the letter 'B', we discovered objects in the room that start with this letter. The Saplings produced Wassily Kandinsky-style trees, utilizing concentric circles and vibrant colors. While outdoors exploring we discussed different deciduous trees and examined their different barks.

Our conversation also covered the topic of tulips, focusing on their development from bulbs, and was complemented by a painting exercise inspired by Georgia O'Keeffe, where





the Saplings were prompted to explore nature and amplify its details.

Our math and manipulatives activities consisted of sequencing flowers by size and sequencing the life cycle of tulips, in addition to counting flowers and creating graph tallies. Shape and number recognition and tracing sheets were also utilized.

Spring weather is full of changes and surprises. Please make sure your child is prepared to stay warm and dry for extended periods of time outdoors each day with lots of weather appropriate layers and footwear. Also needed, a complete change of indoor clothes.

I hope everyone had an amazing and restful spring break! I certainly did enjoy my time with my family. This week has been refocusing on our routine and getting ready for the last part of the school year! We are going to spend April embracing the (hopefully) warm weather, preparing for standardized testing, and revisiting any material that hasn't been fully mastered yet. We are in the continent of Africa for our final destination. This week, we did a Kente Adinkra cloth weaving inspired project. We also watched a video about Africa and its many amazing attributes! We finished up our 5 paragraph essays for our biographies and we will be focusing on the timeline and slideshow next.

Language arts was back in full swing with vocabulary words, writing activities, and fluency. Our word part was "rupt" this week. It was so fun to make connections between words like "erupt", "corrupt", and "interrupt" just based on that part of the word. Student's fluency activity was about squid and octopuses this week. Students compared and contrasted the two creatures as well as making sure I knew all the cool facts there is to know about them. We also read passages about Frida Kahlo, which was exciting because we have done artwork inspired by her in the past. We are making our way through our group books which are still "Tracker", "Because of Winn Dixie", and "Tale of Despereaux." Reading books together creates opportunities to listen to other's expressions, learn words that may be hard to pronounce, and focus on comprehension instead of decoding.

In math, our main focus is revisiting old concepts to make sure we have them mastered. Third grade is preparing for MCA's that are in a few weeks so we are going to spend lots of time looking at concepts that may be challenging still. In second grade, I will be introducing the concept of multiplication and division to prepare them for next year's material. I try to include IXL group jams, Blookets, and Kahoots for a fun engagement tool when we may be feeling stagnant in learning math.


Keep sending warm things! I make students wear snow pants throughout the spring as I don't want them cold and wet when we come back in. With all the snow we received, it will continue to be a very muddy spring. Also keep reading with your children at home! I notice a huge difference when students are reading aloud to their parents, family members, and even pets at home!

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From Ms. Sara Silence 4th & 5th Grade Elementary Teacher

What a weird week! On Monday we were celebrating warmer weather and spring vacation, Wednesday no school, and Friday we are back outside with melting snow! The class embraced this week and rolled with it. We worked on our writing skills to share a story about spring break to Mrs. Coronis. Students continue working on their computer skills and formatting as they type their letters. Our reading stories this week focused on Greek Mythology. Some students had some background knowledge which helped the whole group with understanding and sparked interest.

Monday and Tuesday in math, we reviewed fraction concepts by scooting around the gym to stations for problem solving. Thursday and Friday, we moved onto the last units for math. Students explored units of measurement by measuring things in the classroom in both centimeters in millimeters. Next they built towers and calculated the volume in centimeters and millimeters. We have also begun our review tasks for the upcoming MCA's. Students have two sources of review work to look for trouble spots. This could be content they need more practice with, something they don't understand, something using new vocabulary, or maybe something they haven't seen



yet. The goal is to have students identify any areas and get support instruction now so they are not frustrated later.

Next Wednesday, April 9th, the class will have an outdoor learning day.

The weather should be around 40 degrees. Please make sure your child has layers to be outside for most of the day. Since it will be above the melting point, an extra pair of pants or mittens might be a good idea to send along.

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
