Nursery rhymes and folk tales were our focus this week in Seedlings. We read different versions of *The Three Little Pigs* and *Little Red Riding Hood*. While reading *The Three Little Pigs*, the Seedlings practiced taking big breaths and blowing them out. We also utilized hand puppets to "animate" the story. The puppets also provided an object for the younger Seedlings to exercise their visual tracking. A coloring sheet of *Little Red Riding Hood* was given to the older Seedlings to color so they could work on their fine motor skills. We also read a book of Mother Goose nursery rhymes and sang quite a few of them such as *Humpty Dumpty, Hickory Dickory Dock*, and *Pat-a-Cake*.

Our walks outside have been continuing every day as the weather allows. The bike path offers freedom and safety for the Seedlings to be able to explore the natural world around them. We are also practicing our listening skills as we walk, such as "stay on the path". While in the classroom, our climbing triangle is getting a lot of use as the older



Seedlings work their gross motor skills to climb up and over to slide down the small slide. The younger Seedlings have been enjoying tummy time to work their core muscles.

### From Ms. Pam Holm

Sapling Teacher, Birch Grove Community Service

*Life in and Around Pond* was Sapling's theme for the week, focusing on pond life, biodiversity, and ecosystems to foster an appreciation for nature and the importance of preserving pond habitats and their inhabitants. Our exploration encompassed beavers, otters, muskrats, ducks, frogs, turtles, salamanders, lily pads, and cattails. The sensory bin was reimagined as a pond filled with stuffed animals. In the science area, we examined the life cycle of frogs, using plastic frogs and tadpoles, and manipulative tongs to facilitate feeding.

Saplings refined their math skills through exercises of counting with 1:1 correspondence using frogs on lily pads and ducks, categorizing pond life, and recognizing numbers by stacking turtles. Symmetry was explored using pattern blocks to create mirrored designs on turtle shells. Literacy focused on identifying words in a story, finding what is different in a picture, along with frogs on a log letter recognition and pond letter mats.



The Saplings undertook large motor activities, which involved hopping like a frog on lily pads, crawling like a turtle without shedding their shells and mastering the game of *Duck*, *Duck*, *Grey Duck*.

As part of their artistic endeavors this week, Saplings constructed a paper beaver and frog, watercolor painting of a mallard in a pond, tempera painting of a salamander and a 3-D tissue paper turtle. These craftivities were highly effective for improving fine motor skills and stimulating creativity.



Back at Birch Grove our class has been busy wrapping up many of the unit projects this week. During our reading block we have been reading the nonfiction text about the last USA region, the West.
